Rooming and General Information

Due to the limited number of rooms available we encourage participants to stay as many to a room as possible. Remember you are only in the rooms for a short time. People staying the entire seminar will be given priority on rooming.



Anne has participated in many basketry exhibits, has won many awards for her work. She is an active member of the National Basketry Organization. Anne has been teaching basketry for about 32 years and is still fascinated with the woven form.

Janet Daughtry – Just one class from AG extension about 30 years



ago and Janet was hooked on weaving. A North Carolina native, she loves Appalachian and Cherokee styles. After retiring from teaching kindergarten and raising four children, Janet has had more time to devote to her "obsessions." She enjoys demonstrating at festivals and as a member of the Village of Yesteryear, a NC multi-arts guild. Janet

has been teaching professionally for about 10 years, locally, at guild seminars, at conventions and internationally through women's ministry missions activities. Her work has been exhibited in the Raleigh Convention Center for the past two years.



Patty Feather – Patty began weaving in 2000, attending numerous conferences and exploring unusual materials and techniques in her designs. Patty has been teaching professionally for 9 years, starting in a mixed media artist's guild in Paducah, KY, and expanding her exposure by forming active guilds in Paducah and Mayfield, KY and in Evansville, IN. Patty has a BA

in education and resides in Florida with her husband. Her basket making supply business, Feather Baskets, is based out of her home, where she develops new basket designs. She spends most of her time teaching at conferences, retreats, schools, guilds and any group interested in learning about basket weaving.



Debbie Hurd – Debbie began weaving about 28 years ago at a community education program in Arkansas. She happily retired from teaching and is now active designing new baskets, traveling and working with her local guild. She has taught in conventions, guilds and in small groups all over the country. She and Candace Katz co-own the business, Bases to Weave.

Nancy Jones – Nancy has been making "original" twill designs



since 2006. She specializes in the interlacing technique for making petro glyph figures. Nancy has been featured as a "New Face" in the NBO quarterly magazine and teaches for state conventions, workshops and the John C. Campbell Folk School. Visit her on: www. nancyjonesbaskets.com

Karen Kotecki – Karen's license plate holder sums up her philosophy: "I'd Rather Be Basketweaving!" Baskets are her artistic passion. She finds the creative process of weaving to be the best medicine for a bored mind or a tired spirit. Karen works in all materials and will never have enough time to weave all the baskets she wants to...what a wonderful thought!

Karen Maugans – Karen and her husband, Kim, live in Virginia. They own and operate, K-n-K Creations basket weaving supply company.

Barbara McCormick – Barbara was born and raised in Mount



Pleasant, SC where she learned the trade of sweetgrass basket weaving from her grandmother, mother, aunts and other family members at a very early age. She has since carried on this tradition and has shared her talent with other including her family. Barbars teaches several classes along the east coast

and has her work displayed in several publications. Sweetgrass basket weaving is an art form that came from West Africa over 300 years ago during the time of slavery.

Dona Nazarenko – Dona and husband, Warren, are owners of



Country Spirit Baskets in Tunbridge, VT where Dona has a studio workshop for teaching. Warren, too, has his own shop to make the necessary accessories for her baskets. Dona has been weaving for over 25 years and likes to share her basketry tips and methods with others. She is excited to design

pieces with the birch bark from their property. Some of her styles include a touch of whimsy and others have lines of simplicity to them but all have an element for the student to gather and learn something fun.

Becki Newsome – Becki began weaving baskets with several friends in 1992. She did not join Coastal Weavers until 2001 but was doing some individual teaching before that time. After joining the guild she began learning from seasoned weavers many new techniques and has applied these techniques and hints into her own style of weaving. Becki has taught basketry in her own community since 1998 and at various weave-ins and conventions throughout the South. She is always trying to learn new styles and ways of weaving which she gladly passes on to her students, giving credit to the instructor who taught her.

Billy Owens – Billy is a second generation white oak basket maker.



His father, Dale Owens, was founder of Owens Oak Baskets almost 30 years ago in southern Missouri. Billy now has a third and fourth generations to help him weave and carry on the tradition and business. All materials used by Billy are from white oak timber grown in the Ozarks.

He selects, cuts and "hand splits" the wood with a homemade tool called a "split knife" which was designed by his father. Billy has taught classes all over the country and enjoys sharing everything white oak with his students. His goal, first and foremost, is the students in class having an enjoyable time as well as leaving with a finished white oak basket that they will enjoy and last a lifetime.

Joni Dee Ross – Joni's philosophy is "eat, sleep, weave." She made



her first basket in 1989 and discovered the perfect expression of her exuberant optimism and joy in life. She founded Handmade North Carolina Baskets in 1991 and also co-owns The Woodland Nantucket Retreat Company. Joni has written and published over 75 basket patterns. In addition to

teaching weekly basketry classes in her studio, she regularly teaches at conventions, private guilds and art center all over the United States. She and her business partner will soon be publishing a book of basket patterns and weaving techniques. Joni's husband, David, and children, Craig and Lindsey-Dee, make her love for baskets a true family affair.

Kay Swanstrom – Kay has been weaving since 2001 and is



currently the president of the Shooting Creek Basket guild in NC. She is also presently teaching at the community college in Murphy, NC. Kay has taught at the John C Campbell Folk School and at state conventions around the country and has demonstrated her skills for an international display of arts sponsored by the NBO.

Tika Tucker – Tika says it's hard to know just what got her started



making baskets. Was it that first one she made in Girl Scouts, the variety I saw in Rose's, or was it Mom saying, "Make do or do without?" She did a lot of "making" while growing up and it has become a constant and well-loved part of her life. Basket were such a natural way to play with color,

shape and design that once she started she couldn't stop. That was back in 1992 and she still loves it! Tika finds teaching most rewarding. Tika says, "There are so many cool women who make baskets. Where else can you solve problems; go for days with too little sleep; work 'til your fingers bleed and your neck, back and shoulders ache; eat your weight in peanut butter sandwiches; make friends from all over the country; go home exhausted and wake up planning your next basket trip?"

Marilyn Wald – Marilyn is the owner of XYZ Basketworks which



she formed in 1992. She has been weaving since 1988 and began teaching with only two students. Marilyn has taught at conventions, guilds and workshops around the United States and Canada. She has been featured in Basket Bits Magazine and Just Patterns. Students make teaching

basketry special for her and it is rewarding for her to see the look on a weaver's face when she completes a basket. Karen Zane – Through the years Karen has taught in over twenty states at conventions, seminars and private businesses. She was one of seven teachers asked to teach on the first "Weaving a Dream" cruise. Karen has designed several of her own baskets and has published three booklets on rib and antler baskets. Karen has been featured in several publications including Just Patterns and in an online feature of The Craft Report Magazine.

Laura Lee Zanger – Laura Lee has been designing baskets and



writing patterns since October 2000. She has been teaching on the basketry convention circuit since 2002 and enjoys expressing her creativity in Cherokee, Choctaw and Chitimacha twill designs. She travels the country teaching Southeastern Native American twill techniques and shares her excitement

and enthusiasm for weaving with everyone she encounters while maintaining the fascination of a child with every new idea, lesson and experience. Laura Lee is a published author and her goal is to enlighten everyone on the thrill of twill weaving in the Native American tradition of the single and double woven baskets.
